

Bob Halliday's "The Story of BSA motorcycles", although published back in the late '70's, has become a popular and even, a standard history of that great marque. We were lucky to pick up a copy in mint condition from the Port Elliot bookshop on the Strand. Well worth visiting if you are interested in motoring books.


Halliday's book on the BSA highlights the company's racing successes together with the bikes which were developed from those heady days. Bikes such as the 'Gold Star' series, and finally, the 750 cc, 3 cylinder, 'Rocket', with which the company, in coordination with TRIUMPH, hoped to muscle-in to the Japanese-dominated super bike scene.

Read how it all came apart... A really wonderful read for all motorcyclists.

G.N. Georgano's "A Motor racing camera, 1874-1916", another truly fascinating book is Yes, another book by that celebrated author, this time for the National Motor Museum Trust (UK). The dangerous sport of motor car racing was always firmly linked to the early development of the camera. The camera captured, for posterity, many of the great early races where drivers threw caution (and sanity?) to the wind to push frail but visually awesome machines—iron frames on high, narrow, wheels and with boiling radiators—to astonishing feats of bravery, stupidity, and speed. The camera was there to record the wins, spills, death and glory of those pioneer automobile racers!



It was a very scenic drive. The lunch was lovely and to have our own dining area was nice too. Somehow, we all found plenty to talk about at each table.


The weather was not too bad except for the time of departure as **Leigh and Zofia Phillips** found out in their CLUBMAN—even with the roof on!

Those of you who weren't able to be there, we will see you next year to join in some of the fun.





Another word for "failure"

always love the Philip Adams quote that one of the few words that rhymes with "Australia" is "failure".

Of course, for those of us of a certain age, Ford's Edsel will always be the car that most dramatically failed in the market-place. They should have known something was wrong when then-fashionable Brooklyn poet Marianne Moore suggested names for the new marque like "Pastelogram", "Resilient Bullet", "Varsity Stroke", "Andante con Moto", "Mongoose Civique" and, best of all, "Utopian Turtletop".

Ford expected to sell 100,000 Edsels in 1958; but just 63,110 left showrooms and sales went steadily downhill from there.

Many corporate executives were so embarrassed being seen to buy the biggest pig-in-a-poke ever offered by the motoring industry, they hid the cars away, so quite a few pristine examples reappeared years later.

When the new name, Edsel, was announced, PR director Dick Krafve, reportedly said, "We have just lost 200,000 sales." When the over-hyped new model was released, it was with a TV spectacular starring Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra and Rosemary Clooney (in a precursor of things to come, her car wouldn't start).

Of course, Edsels are now very collectable. And despite the huge and very public failure, Ford came back just a few years later with the revolutionary (for America, at least) pony car, the Mustang and the rest, as they say, is history.



The Swallow Doretti, an historic dead end

hen I was looking for a Triumph TR3 to buy and restore, I came across a car I knew little about. The Swallow Doretti, (Italian for "Dorothy", named, in an echo of the naming of Mercedes decades before, after the daughter of one of the car's originators), managed sales of only 276 before the plug was pulled.

The usual reason is that the Swallow Coachbuilding Company (1935) Ltd., (related to, but a few removes, from the company founded by Sir William Lyons as Swallow Sidecars that ultimately became Jaguar Cars), was making nothing more than a rebodied TR2 that didn't go as well.

The Doretti lasted just 10 months and the 276 they sold compared to the 244 TR2s from Triumph sold in 1953—so the Swallow was actually *more* successful. The Doretti slotted neatly in between the TR2 and the Austin-Healey 100 and had many of the qualities of both. The car was designed by Frank Rainbow, and the rather clunky grille was designed with the American market in mind. The engine was set 18cm further back on the chassis, resulting in a 52/48 weight distribution. A Mk II Doretti had a slightly stiffer frame, the fuel tank mounted vertically between the cockpit and boot, two genuine child seats and a decent luggage area.

The end came when a number of suppliers, including Jaguar who didn't appreciate the competition, demanded the company stick to its traditional role and get out of the car business. It was a case of being too successful. And try as I might, I couldn't convince the widow of the original owner to sell me the car, (nor could I convince the owner of a Daimler SP250 to sell me that, either), so I restored a TR3A instead.

And that's how the fight started... We were at a wedding and I whispered to my wife, "Why does the bride wear white?" "Because white is the colour of happiness," she replied "and today is the happiest day of her life." "Ah," I said, "that probably explains why the groom is wearing black."

Citroën gives up on the Australian market



The Citroën 5CV sold more than 2000 examples in Australia.
It was a challenge to drive.

n a sign of things to come, one of the most historic brand names in Australia has pulled out of the local market. Citroën started selling cars here in 1920 and the first documented around Australia drive was completed in 1925 in a 1923 5CV Type C Torpedo Citroën.

(I've driven it, and believe me, driving it around Australia was a huge achievement—it had a 856cc engine and two seats. Neville Westwood, one of the two drivers, was 6'3" or 190cm.)

Over 2000 5CVs were sold in Australia. Citroën has always done things a little differently, and they will be sorely missed.
